Subject: Hurricane Michael-Damage Financing Options

STATEMENT OF ISSUE:

This agenda item is intended to seek the City Commission's direction and authorization to pursue funding to pay the cost of Hurricane Michael. On Wednesday, October 10, 2018, a category 4 hurricane, named Michael, slammed the western part of Florida and left a trail of devastation in its path. The damage to the City's electrical grid is great, which left about 4,750 residents without electricity for more than one week. The storm also caused tremendous property damage including damage to the roof of many citizens' properties and to governmental structures. The total estimated damage to the electrical system and general government is \$3,154,114. See Attachment 1-City Commission's Workshop Documents. One hundred ninety-three thousand, six hundred dollars (\$193,600) of this amount is for damages to the general government. The Utility System had a net loss in revenue of \$103,539, because of the short number of days of power outages.

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is expected to reimburse the City for 75% of its cost, and the State of Florida is expected to cover the cost of the remaining 25% of cost related to the hurricane. (FEMA may reimburse the City for 90% of its cost; however, FEMA has not yet decided.) Although, the City can expect reimbursement from FEMA through the State of Florida; the date of the reimbursement is uncertain. Affected Florida utilities have not received reimbursement from Hurricane Irma, which occurred in 2017.

Our current estimate for the materials and equipment for electric system restoration is \$200,000. The estimate for the restoration of the fiber system is \$800,000.

In addition to restoring the electric system, the City staff has outlined a program of storm hardening which would replace copper overhead electric lines and utility poles that are over 35 years old. Included in the storm hardening efforts would be the use of an outside contractor, Wolf Tree Trimming Service, to cut back trees and vegetation from electric lines and utilize additional budgeted personnel. The cost of the outside contractor would be \$187,000 per year.

Statement of Issue:

The information provided herein pertains to a task order from Dewberry Engineering, Inc. for the survey and design of the project to pipe the remaining open portion the Shelfer Street Outfall south of Hamilton Street.

Background Information:

The Shelfer Street Outfall is the discharge point for the City's drainage system which takes care of the area south of US 90, and most of what was contained on either side of Shelfer Street along with numerous residential units. This ditch was open flow from Martin Luther King south as late as the early '70's.

In the early '80's, the block from Martin Luther King to Flagler Street was piped with box culvert in an effort to provide two-way traffic within that block of Shelfer. Again in the "90's, the block between Flagler Street and Hamilton Street was piped with box culvert to again provide two-way traffic during a paving project.

Now the City Commission has deemed it necessary to close the remaining portion of the outfall ditch from Hamilton Street south to a point pass any of existing residential units in the area. There has been \$250,000 placed in this year's budget for the purpose of this project.

All the City's server infrastructures for City Hall, Fire Department, Police Department, Utilities Department, and all other departments using email, ADG Financial Government Software and General File and Print servers have suffered multiple outages and are in disrepair. The solution suggested will provide stability and redundancy for all present and future computing needs. This will also allow for the back office server support for Smart Grid management.

Information Technology receives quotes for the software from two different vendors. Hardware and labor is required to set up the virtual servers for both operation and redundancy. The server power currently includes ten or more servers, of which four major servers are not operating consistently. The implementation of this project will cause the removal of the defective servers and allow all local and external servers on our network to be located and managed in one location. This will also have a positive impact on the server used for the Smart Grid (Tantalus).

AmeriCorps VISTA program is more than a service opportunity; it is designed to also build valuable leadership and project management skills. AmeriCorps VISTA members earn a Segal Education award, which can be put towards future higher education expenses or to pay off student loans. AmeriCorps VISTA members who successfully complete a year of service can opt to receive either the education award (approximately \$6,000) or the end-of-service cash stipend (\$1,800). On January 15, 2020, the City of Quincy executed the agreement and accepted the awarded grant funds of \$1 million dollars from the Office of the Governor, State of Florida, Hurricane Michael State Recovery Program. These funds were awarded for the period of July 1, 2019 and shall end on September 30, 2020. This can be spent for expenses. The scope of the work is to address storm damages which affected the water, gas, sewer, outage management, public safety communications towers, the Gadsden County's Emergency Operation Center, City Hall and County operations, street lighting on HWY 90 and HWY 267, and data collection for its 4,835 customer accounts.

On March 24, 2020, the Commissioners attended a workshop concerning these funds and other grant funds, in order to discuss how to spend the funds. The Commissioners approved disbursing \$184,500 as turnkey deductible expenses, \$348,568 to match other grants, such as CDBG and EPA, and the balance was to be held pending an assessment of COVID-19 and other factors.

Subsequently, EPA released the requirement for the \$298,568, thus increasing the unappropriated portion of the \$1 million to \$765,500. The Commissioners held a workshop on July 1, 2020 to review the options for appropriation of the funds.

The City Commission purchased the land for City Hall on October 19, 1959, and erected City Hall in 1965. (Mayor Leon E. Weaver, Mayor Pro Tem Howard V. Fletcher, Commissioners, Everette E. Gay, E. W. "Ned" Hinson, and Charles W. Thomas, Jr. appear on the City Hall plaque.) The newly erected City Hall has been the site for City Commission meetings and City business for the past fifty-five (55) years. Though the City Hall physical space has adapted over time, the building has not been renovated in decades. The changes that occurred happen in the second half of the 2000 decade.

The last significant improvement occurred between 2006 and 2011. These improvements included a high-efficiency HVAC upgrade and roof replacement, the laying of inside non-slippery tiling flooring, placement of interior sheetrock in the Finance Department, Clerk's Office, Building, and Planning office, and HR Office. The City had not made any significant improvements to the City Commission Chambers since 1965.

In July/August, Mayor Harris and Staff visited the meeting chambers in Leon County and Tallahassee July/August 2000 and met with two firms to discuss the renovation and gain a feel for the project cost. The present City Chambers needs renovation in the dais design and seating, significant technological upgrades to include enhanced acoustics and video equipment that will broadcast meetings in high resolution better accessibility ramping, lighting, speaker podium design and upgrade, COVID 19 design improvements, including a resign of the entrance to City Hall at the main entrance to help with social distancing inside and outside of City Hall to regulate the number and frequency of person entering the building.

This Agenda Item is a request for approval by the Commission to make an emergency repair to city storm drainage system.

Background:

On September 16, 2020 the City of Quincy experienced between 8 to 10 inches of rain from Hurricane Sally. During that time staff assessed all City streets to insure they were in safe condition to travel.
