Dear Ms. Perkins:

This letter serves as Legal Services of North Florida's request for inclusion of \$20,000 in funds in the 2021-2022 budget for the City of Quincy. This is an increase to the amount remitted by the City of Quincy during the FY20-21 budget cycle based on increased civil legal needs as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and continued recovery from Hurricane Michael as rebuild funds have become available. We also see a continued need to support heirs' property/title clearing as families become increasingly aware of the importance of clear title.

These funds allow for 153.8 hours of legal assistance at our average hourly rate of \$130.02. In addition, LSNF has continued to successfully leverage existing funds and partnerships to expand services in Quincy. This has included expanded outreach, community education, and on-site legal clinics, including significant resources to support legal issues in recovery from Hurricane Michael and more recently addressing legal issues arising out of the COVID-19 pandemic. Showing the existing support of the county has aided us in bringing these additional resources.

During FY 20-21, with the support of the \$10,000 received in the current fiscal year, LSNF has handled 252 cases affecting 684 City of Quincy residents in a variety of cases such as employment issues, family law, housing, and consumer, obtaining monetary benefits through foreclosure prevention, title clearing/heir property, Social Security benefits, child and spousal support awards. and other avenues. As we continue recovery from both the pandemic and Hurricane Michael, these issues continue and are expected to increase with eviction and foreclosure moratoria coming to an end:

We hope that you will continue to see our work as a valuable resource which maintains stability and manages the legal needs of the most vulnerable portion of our population. Based on a recent economic impact study, the City of Quincy's \$20,000 funding to LSNF translates to \$143,800 in economic benefits to the community.

In 2019-2020 Quincy Main Street was awarded both Operational Funds and Promotional Funds. In the 2020-2021 Budget we were awarded us only Promotional Funds.

I am requesting both for 2022 since our missions closely align with each other. The Florida Main Street programs encourages cities to support their main street program since so much of our work overlaps. We both work on code enforcement and incentives to promote new business downtown. We both collaborate on holiday programs. I've assisted the CRA with the CARES money placement and the painting project. Dear Mr. McLean, Mayor Harris, and City of Quincy Commissioners,

Thank you for the City of Quincy's generous support of the Gadsden Arts Center & Museum this year! It been quite a year for all of us, with some valuable learning experiences for Gadsden Arts. 14 months ago, when Gadsden Arts closed its buildings to help protect our community from covid-19, we asked, "how can we continue to serve our mission?" The following week, we began to develop live and recorded online programs to bring the novelty, enrichment, connectedness, and self-expression offered by art experiences to everyone at home.

During the past year, Gadsden Arts has brought all of our programs to children, families, adults, and seniors online, at home, in schools, and at the museum. We have developed new ways of reaching more people, overcoming obstacles of time, transportation, and funding, and these will remain part of our program long-term. We have discovered new ways of connecting with a broad regional audience, attracted new visitors to the museum, and figured out how to bring more art into children's homes.

At the end of the day, pandemic or not, Gadsden Arts' impacts are these:

Art Education and Enrichment for Children Lifelong Learning Experiences for Adults and Seniors Bringing People Together Tourism & Economic Growth

This past year, Gadsden Arts has applied half of the \$10,000 City of Quincy funding to support Major Exhibitions, which are central to education, tourism, and economic impacts; and half to our Art for Children programs, bringing art interpretation and art making programs to children in a variety of ways, free of charge.

Last fall, we piloted two new programs that are really powerful – Art @ Home Kits, and the Teen Art Council. Last fall, we recognized that 70% of school children in Gadsden County began the year from home, isolated from their peers. They needed fun, creative activities to offset screen time and pencil/paper learning. Free Art @ Home Kits brought art making fun into 500 children's households.

Your investment in Gadsden Arts has made it possible for us to continue our other pilot program, the Teen Art Council, this year. This exciting program was launched in September 2020 with a grant from Art Bridges foundation, and we are thrilled with its initial results. The Gadsden Arts TAC employs teens who love art, introducing them to the museum, its exhibitions, and museum careers, and has the teens design art programs for their peers. Our first seven TAC students tell us they have loved the program. They have learned a lot, and connected teens and families to the museum through two student competitions, and family art activities and tours they designed and managed during Porchfest.

While Gadsden Arts has sustained and increased arts programming for our community, and community support remains strong, earned revenues have declined sharply during the pandemic. Our organization has proactively reduced our budget by 19%, without cutting any programming, to help offset this decline until earned revenues recover. We have also sought new grant funding, and continue to carefully manage expenses.

We ask the City of Quincy to consider renewing your support at \$10,000 in the upcoming fiscal year. This funding will:

- Help sustain the current scope and quality of our exhibitions program, which offer quality
 educational experiences for people of all ages, and is a a key to economic recovery by attracting
 increasing numbers of visitors into Quincy;
- Help sustain our free Art for Children programs, including the Teen Art Council, Art @ Home Kits, Guided School Tours, and ArtReach After School partnerships.

You will find in this packet detailed information about our programs and impacts in 2020 and 2021, and financial information. Thank you for being an important part of Gadsden Arts' efforts to improve quality of life for everyone in our community!

Statement of Issue:

The information provided herein concerns the Commission approval to enter into an agreement with Dewberry Engineers Inc. for Virginia Street Drainage Basin Study.

Background:

As the Commission is aware, through efforts of staff and Dewberry, the City of Quincy has reached out to Dewberry Engineers Inc. to provide a study for the Virginia Street Drainage Area. There was a study completed back in 2011 by Hatch McDonald in reference to localized flooding. Several years ago, staff has gone out and installed storm drain housing at the corner of Martin Luther King Blvd and Virginia Street and a storm water catch basin at the corner of Virginia Street and Flagler Street. Unfortunately, that didn't rectify the flooding issues.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff feels it is important to precede in making the proper approach to repairing the flooding issues that Virginia Street and Flagler Street are experiencing. This report provides generalized recommendations of proposed improvements that would mitigate future flooding. After meeting with Dewberry, Staff asked Dewberry to prepare a Scope

of Work to implement the recommendation of the evaluation. Dewberry proposes to provide these services for a lump sum fee of \$ 19,550.00 (GL: 001-430-541-60634). See Exhibit "A" - Task Order attached.

Options:

- Vote to approve the Task Order with Dewberry Engineering for the proposed work of Design and Permitting, Surveying and Contractor Procurement for the Virginia Street Drainage Basin Study for \$19,550.

This Task Order is for the purpose of Dewberry Engineers Inc (Dewberry) as the ENG(NEER to provide professional services for the Virginia Street Drainage Basin Improvements project for the City of Quincy (City) acting by and through its Commission.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

Surveying

 DEI shall complete a topographic survey of area which contributes to the Virginia St / Flagler St drainage system. This survey will include all drainage structures, pipes, and open channel swales. Impervious areas such as buildings and paved areas shall be determined from current aerial Imagery. Proposed Fee: \$6,500.00

Design & Permitting

- DEI shall evaluate the existing conditions survey outlined above to determine what improvements can be made to re-direct a portion of the contributing flow or enhance the capacity of the existing storm sowor infrastructuro. Recommendations will be provided to the City based on the findings of this review. The City shall negotiate required drainage easements with private land owners.
- DEI shall complete, as necessary, a Hydrologic and Hydraulic (H&H) study of the subject basin to evaluate pipe sizes and provide recommendations for new pipe sizes.
- 3. DEI shall prepare construction drawings necessary to bid and build all proposed improvements.
- DEI shall prepare all necessary permit applications and respond to regulatory agency comments. Proposed Fee: \$11,250,00

Contractor Procurement

- 1. DEI shall develop project bid package and technical specifications required for contractor procurement.
- DEI shall respond to all Requests for Additional Information from bidders.
- 3. DEI shall review all bids and make recommendations on bid award.

Proposed Fee: \$1,800.00

SUBJECT:	Conversion from Overhead to Underground Along East King Street.

Statement of Issue:

Conversion of 4500 feet from overhead to underground electric lines along East King St. to Henry Grady Road from Camellia Drive.

Background:

The Adams Street outage on Saturday, November 27, 2021 was caused by a tree related issue. This particular feeder line is far off the now City owned Right-of-Way along Highway 12 or East King Street. Utilities Department would like to begin the process of converting the line to underground electric. It will require 4,500 feet of trenching or directional boring (or both) to include 3 phase wiring with extension of fiber optic cable for our fiber optic grid and meter reading out to Point Milligan. This will help eliminate the North East feeder from losing power in this tree troubled wetland area. It will also eliminate changing out 5 or 6 utility poles currently standing in water (40 to 55 years old) in need of changing. It will remove areal lines in front of the airport. The estimated cost by Contract plus City Crews is \$198,000 dollars.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends replacing the overhead lines with underground lines to eliminate future pole changes and tree/hurricane problems.

Options:

- Option 1. Vote to replace the overhead lines with underground lines.
- Option 2. Commissioners provide direction for Department.
