Item #1: Black History Month 2022 - Parade and Festival Partnership: City of Quincy and Gadsden County

Summary of the Discussion by Staff and the Commission

Mayor Harris stated that there are three items for discussion on the agenda.

Mayor Harris stated that if there's no objection, he would like to begin with the Black History Month 2022 - Parade and Festival Partnership.

Interim City Manager Dr. Beverly Nash stated that information on the Black History Parade and Festival was presented to the Commission at the last meeting and tabled.

Interim City Manager Dr. Beverly Nash referred to the Black History packet provided by the county administrator, laying out the festival activities and sponsorship pricing.

Commissioner Sapp questioned why the Commission is receiving a packet dated January 7 when the event is in two days.

Interim City Manager Dr. Beverly Nash stated that she received the County's packet last Thursday.

Interim City Manager Dr. Beverly Nash stated that she could not explain the lack of communication.

Interim City Manager Dr. Beverly Nash stated that the County requested a \$20,000 partnership donation.

Interim City Manager Dr. Beverly Nash reiterated that she had no explanation for the timeline and would have presented the packet to the Commission earlier.

Interim City Manager Dr. Beverly Nash stated that the County is looking for the City to partner with them.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that the County selected Oscar Veneszee to host Friday's reception and raise \$25,000 for scholarships.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that the Commission is invited to attend Friday's reception at the Dean Mitchell Gallery.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that the tickets are complementary.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that the Commission would receive two complimentary tickets.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that the reception program would honor Shakerria Allen, Sameriyah Bradwell, Ke'Mari Cooper, and Jarvis Rittman. They have achieved success while attending grade school, high school, and college.

Commissioner Bass-Prieto asked whether a funding source had been identified.

Commissioner Bass-Prieto stated that the City should have been more involved in the planning process, especially when spending citizens' money.

Interim City Manager Dr. Beverly Nash stated that this is an unbudgeted item and that no funding source had been identified.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that monies received from fundraising would make the City's donation \$12,000 – \$15,000.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that the County did not partner with any other Cities around the tri-county but the City of Quincy.

Commissioner Sapp asked if the County would be seeking the City's assistance for Cinco de Mayo.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that the County did not say if they would not ask the City for assistance in Cinco de Mayo but seeks to partner with the other Cities.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that there would be no guest artist, just a DJ.

Interim Building and Planning Director Charles Hayes stated that a sponsor would take care of the \$10,000 donation to FAMU Marching 100.

Mayor Harris stated that he agrees with the partnership; however, the County failed to communicate with the City on this event.

Commissioner Sapp noted also that the County did not do its best to communicate.

Mayor Harris asked what it would cost the City to be a good neighbor and donate to Friday's reception.

Mayor Pro Tem Dowdell suggested donating \$2,500.

Mayor Harris noted that \$2,500 is the top sponsorship.

Commissioner Sapp suggested \$2,500- \$5,000 to cover a specific cost.

Commissioner Sapp noted that Jarvis Rittman, one of the honorees, grew up in the City of Quincy, district one.

With no further discussion, Commissioner Sapp offered a motion to contribute \$2,500 to FAMU Marching 100 transportation meal. Mayor Harris seconded the motion.

City Attorney Gary Roberts stated that the Commission could not stop employees from unionizing.

Commissioner Sapp stated that there's a lot of information given, and she's not prepared to make a decision tonight.

Mayor Pro Tem Dowdell stated that it is up to the employees to unionize.

Kathy Smith stated that the City would need to complete a portion of the voluntary petition.

Mayor Pro Tem Dowdell stated that he had no problems with the voluntary recognition.

Kathy Smith stated that the employees are aware that voluntary recognition is easier.

Kathy Smith stated that an employee does not have to join a union; Florida is a right-to-work state.
